




Labour Market Information

LMI tells us all about the job market. It provides data, statistics and predictions about present and future trends in the workplace. Understanding how to use this data can help you find a job.

Gatsby benchmarks 2 & 4

What does LMI tell us?

- Information about job vacancies and where they are
- Average salaries by occupation and industry
- Future trends – which industries are expected to grow or decline
- Skills and qualifications required by employers including skills gaps
- Workforce change – growth, decline and replacement
- Working patterns for certain industries/occupations


